2013-14 AWARD HOLDER ANNETTE FAYET

Annette undertook fieldwork amongst Manx shearwaters, a seabird, in Pembrokeshire, Wales. They spend most of their lives at sea and can fly thousands of miles across open oceans.

With recent technological advances in the development of miniature tracking devices it is now possible to track them at sea.

Annette's research involved attaching these trackers to both adult birds and juveniles, and tracking their movements over the sea as they foraged for food. The results are fascinating, showing that some birds travelled hundreds of miles over a period of a week or two.
